## Stakeholder Meeting

On Thursday the 7<sup>th</sup> of November, Anton Motha, Brian Reid, Phil Smith & Col Crittenden represented our club at a meeting with Marcus Goonan (Manager-Infrastructure, Planning & Delivery RCOW) and Councillor Harvey Benton (RCOW), Dr Steven Whiting and Ian Kluckow (Golder Environmental Consultants). The meeting was convened to discuss the new Environmental Management Plan (EMP) and the restoration of club facilities and functions lost since the EPA Pollution Abatement Notice was issued in 2016.

The loss of Down The Line on Ground 1 and the loss of all Skeet activities took up much of the meeting. Other topics, such as ongoing management of The Paddock, drainage, removal of contaminated soil stockpiles and administration matters, were also included in the agenda.

As Project Managers, the Rural City of Wangaratta now has a more detailed understanding of the physical layout of the Skeet and DTL disciplines and the RCOW representatives have been briefed on the club's firm intention to have these activities restored. It is anticipated that Council will respond in due course to the matters raised and we look forward to an acceptable outcome for all parties.

# ZZ Competition

The club hosted a ZZ Shoot on Saturday the 14<sup>th</sup> of September. The organisers, Shane, Garb & Dicko from Albury, had been looking around for a venue and, fortunately for all concerned, a conversation with Anton Motha got the ball rolling. Twenty five shooters took part in the event, many travelling up from Melbourne and some even further. Entry costs were certainly high compared to DTL and Sporting Clays, but the cash prizes were sensational.
